Sanctified in the Truth (JL-107) John 17:17,19 Sunday, November 26, 2006

<u>John 17</u>

Conclude what has been a four week <u>examination</u> of the doctrine of <u>sanctification</u>.

Beginning 3 weeks ago with the **definition** and **Biblical call** for **holiness** *in the life of the Christian*.

Then turning to look at the **means** of **sanctification** – the emphasis on HOW one is **sanctified** and HOW one is **not sanctified**.

Last week looking at the **importance** of **sanctification** in order that we might be **sent into the world** to *preach the gospel*.

Jhn 17:17-19

Sanctify them <u>in</u> the truth: thy word is truth. As You have sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, <u>that</u> they also might be sanctified <u>in truth</u>.

Summarize direction

PRAY

We began three weeks ago by defining Biblical sanctification –

as the **practical outworking** of **regeneration** in the *faith* and *life* of the Christian –

also called **practical holiness** or **progressive sanctification**.

To summarize,

First of all ... Sanctification is God's will ...

The **command** of <u>Hebrews 12:14</u> is

<u>Follow</u> peace with all men, and <u>holiness</u>, without which <u>no man shall see the Lord</u>:

1 Thess 4: 3

For this is the will of God, your sanctification

This is **no option** for the **Christian**.

Holiness is **required** of God!

We said that **sanctification** is at the same time three things: a **state**, an **action** and a **process**.

1. it is a *state* in that we are

Sanctified ...

This Is our **true** <u>standing</u> before God because of the <u>person</u> and work of Jesus Christ

1 Cor 6:11

And such <u>were</u> some of you: but ye <u>are</u> washed, but ye <u>are</u> sanctified, but ye <u>are</u> justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God.

Aorist tense ... It defines who you ARE because of what has happened to you in Christ.

You are **<u>DECLARED</u>** <u>**righteous**</u> and made <u>positionally</u> holy (**STATE**)

2. <u>Act (Definitively sanctified)</u>

Sanctification is

a once for all **action** – a **definite** one time **act** of divine grace, by which we are *constituted* as holy.

By this will we <u>have been sanctified</u> through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ <u>once for all.</u>

Our **sanctification** was **attained** for us in the **work of Christ** on the cross

In the death of Christ, **sin was conquered** ... not *in theory* but in a **definitive act**!

Some teach that **sanctification** is <u>all positional</u>

that one can be **positionally sanctified**without a corresponding **holiness of life** ...

But Scripturally, *every time* that our **position** or **standing** *in Christ*, Is emphasized, it has **practical** and **real** implications *in the life*.

You are under the enabling grace of God.

This grace is a **transforming grace**Not a *liscentious grace* but
a *grace* that **teaches us deny ungodliness**.

3. Process (progressively sanctified)

Progressive sanctification is

the <u>continuance</u>, <u>maintenance</u>, and <u>progression</u> of **definitive sanctification**

It is our **experience** of

growing in the grace and knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ and therefore progressively being conformed into the image of God

There is a **progressive manifestation** of *God's converting grace* in the life of **every** true Christian

Hbr 10:14

For by one offering He has <u>perfected</u> for all time those who are <u>being sanctified</u>.

Here the **Perfect tense** is used which speaks of a process with its beginning taking place in the past, the results of which have continue to the present.

By the *offering of the cross*, in **that** <u>definitive act</u>, He has **perfected** or **finished** a *resultant process* ...

And that process is your **sanctification**.

Progressive sanctification is

living such a life *that* is **demanded** by the **Scripture** and by the **moral character of God**.

Such sanctification largely occurs in the realm of our experience.

And because of this, it is tainted by cultural background and personal preference,

And so is liable to great error.

It is because of <u>not understanding **positional**</u>, <u>**definitive**</u> and <u>**progressive sanctification**</u>,

that *much of the church* has **strayed** into <u>false teaching</u> in this matter of **sanctification**.

We talked about the two broad categories

Legalism or Antinomianism.

Which either on the one hand,

add laws to the Scripture – and these become *evidence* of sanctification – that is one is sanctified as he *fulfills* a <u>list of *dos* and *donts*</u>.

Christianity is not a system of works and laws,

Christianity is **Jesus Christ** ... His **person**, His **work**, <u>redeeming the soul</u>, <u>transforming the life</u>, and the <u>implanting of a heart's desire</u> to **please Him**.

That is **biblical sanctification**.

Or on the other hand,

Antinomianism - a complete setting aside of the law of God – that is denying that the law of God has any value in the life of the NT Christian

Is just as <u>errant</u>, <u>false</u> and <u>destructive</u> a **heresy**.

Though <u>shrouded</u> in <u>Biblical language</u>,
it **departs** from an <u>objective standard</u> of the **Word of God**and makes <u>sanctification</u>
entirely a matter of <u>feeling</u> and <u>pragmatic principles</u>.

In the first century, **Jude** and **Peter** dealt with Antinomian heresy.

Jude warned in v. 4 of his epistle:

For there are certain men crept in unawares, who were before of old ordained to this condemnation, ungodly men, <u>turning</u> the grace of our God into lasciviousness ...

God's law, that is **His Word**, is the **ONLY** revealed **standard of holiness**.

And we WILL **NOT submit ourselves**

to the *dos and donts* of *Pharisaeism* on the one hand

or to the <u>lisentiousness</u> of <u>antinomianism</u> on the other hand.

The <u>Antinomian camp</u> will argue ...

Romans 10:4

For Christ is the <u>end of the law</u> unto righteousness to everyone who believes.

Or Gal 3:24-25

Therefore the Law has become our tutor to lead us to Christ, that we may be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are <u>no longer under a tutor</u>.

Is not the *law a mere shadow* – the *substance of which is Christ*?

All of this is true ... however,

Rom 10:4 – **does not teach** us that the <u>law has been abrogated</u>.

But rather that it is **not** the **basis** of our <u>justification</u>

There is **no salvation** by **law works** ... For *Christ is the END of the law* – <u>unto righteousness</u>.

We are **justified** by <u>faith alone</u>, in <u>Christ alone</u> NOT by **law-keeping** ...

All of *our righteousness* is the *imputed righteousness* of Christ. There is not *one iota* of merit we can gain by what we do.

We cannot *twist God's arm* by our <u>works</u>, or our <u>praying</u>, <u>Bible reading</u> or <u>fasting</u> ...

God cannot be approached based upon anything we do.

We are free from the law as a standard by which we are judged,

however the **law remains** our **standard** for **holiness** and **determining God's will** and **what pleases Him!**

Realize what the Scripture teaches when it speaks of the law and grace.

Christ has <u>not</u> freed us from the law, <u>but from the curse</u> of the law – that is from the law as a sentence of **condemnation** and **damnation**.

Having become a curse for us (Gal 3:13)

The <u>unbeliever</u> will be <u>judged</u> eternally <u>BY the law</u> as a <u>damning sentence</u> upon his soul.

But we are <u>free from the law</u> as a <u>basis</u> of our **standing before God**And as a basis for our **ultimate judgment**.

Also, we are <u>not under</u> a **principle of law** ...

That is ...

The *law* makes its **demands** – but is **powerless** to **enable**.

But grace enables.

There is no such thing as antinomian grace.

Antinomianism is the great perverter of grace.

1 Thess 4:7-8 warns the *Antinomian* ...

For God has not called us for the purpose of impurity, but in <u>sanctification</u>. Consequently, he who rejects this is not rejecting man but the <u>God</u> who gives His Holy Spirit to you.

We said how these **heresies** are <u>Satan's attack</u> on the most **foundational cornerstone** of *the faith* ... *Sola Scriptura* – *Scripture alone*!

That <u>the Word of God</u> is <u>infallible</u>, <u>inerrant</u>, <u>complete</u>, <u>final</u> ... <u>absolutely authoritative</u> ... and <u>Totally sufficient</u> for **all your needs!**

<u>Scripture</u> has been <u>given</u> to the church – it was <u>delivered</u> to the church as a **body of teaching** –

And *these things*, have been passed down from *generation to generation* ...

entrusted to faithful men to teach

Men have lost their lives over this Word ...

Yet today, there is a **contempt** for *doctrine*, for *teaching* – and an **emphasis** to the contrary

It is quite popular today to say that

it doesn't matter what one believes about **sanctification** – as long as the method <u>makes you happy</u> and <u>seems</u> to make you more holy.

Leave people alone ...

if the <u>Old order Amish</u> man wants to believe that his works draw him <u>closer to God</u>, let him alone.

They're not hurting anyone, what does it matter.

If there's a brother who believes he can **lose his salvation**, and that belief keeps him on the <u>strait and narrow</u> with God – its ok, at least that belief is keeping him from evil and sin.

Such ideas are utterly anti-Biblical.

For **ONLY SCRIPTURE** and

All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is <u>profitable</u> for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, <u>throughly furnished</u> unto all good works. (2 Tim 3:16-17)

Christianity is <u>based on **DOCTRINE**</u> ... and **doctrine** is the *basis* of <u>experience</u> – **not the other way around!**

And Wrong damns ... Truth saves ... Truth sets free!

Paul warned Timothy ...

If anyone teaches otherwise and does not consent to sound words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which accords with godliness, he is proud, knowing nothing, but is obsessed with disputes and arguments over words, from which come envy, strife, reviling ... (1 Tim 6:3-4)

Spiritual growth is *dependent* upon **sound doctrine**.

Your friends in the church have **NO HOPE** of growing in the grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ, where sound doctrine is shunned.

Worse than this, I fear that many in the church will NOT MAKE IT TO GLORY because they are still relying on themselves to complete the work that they agree Christ began in them.

Which is why I gave the charge last time,
to tell people IN THE CHURCH
of the doctrines
which God has revealed to you from Scripture!

Salvation must be **all of God** and **all of Grace** – or there is **no salvation**. and **no sanctification**

Sanctify them, Jesus prays, IN the truth.

If you <u>care about the sanctification of your friends</u> IN THE CHURCH, you will <u>not shy away</u> from discussing <u>sound doctrine</u> with them ...

For yours and their, <u>ONLY HOPE</u> of arriving safely in glory lies in the <u>fact</u> that the whole of our salvation (that is <u>justification</u>, <u>sanctification</u>, <u>glorification</u>) is <u>GOD'S WORK</u> and <u>HIS ALONE</u>!

I therefore KNOW that if I am a child of God, that God will complete the work that He started in me –

and that <u>I will never face God</u> and **stand in his glorious presence** unless I am *faultless* and *blameless* ...

and this does not depend on man who will and runs, but on God who has mercy!

And we will *continue* to **proclaim this** from this pulpit until you all get it!

Realize that if **God's will is your sanctification**, that **Satan** will do everything in his power to keep you from understanding your sanctification.

He is the *father of lies* ... and the *inventor* of **every false doctrine** concerning **sanctification**.

It is the *devil* that has our **Pentecostal friends**running up to altars to have men lay their hands on them
while they wait for **some experience** to **sanctify them**.

It is the *devil* that <u>encourages one to think</u> of his **sanctification** as a **need** for some **experience of POWER**.

It is the *devil* that **invented** the **legalistic methods**of the "<u>Holiness</u>" churches and
<u>Mennonite</u> and
<u>Seventh Day Adventist</u> sects

All of these are <u>his</u> poisonous concoctions to keep us from the <u>one</u> means of <u>true</u> sanctification.

It is the *devil* who would have us seek to **continue** *in the flesh*, that work which *the Spirit has begun*.

<u>People are sitting around waiting</u> for <u>POWER to come</u>, in some <u>supposed</u> second experience of grace

Why is it that you don't find Paul praying for this,

rather he prays in Eph 1:17-21

that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give to you the spirit of <u>wisdom</u> and <u>revelation</u> in the <u>knowledge</u> of Him, the <u>eyes of your understanding being</u> <u>enlightened</u>; that you may <u>know</u>

what is the <u>hope of His calling</u>, what are the <u>riches of the glory of His inheritance</u> in the saints, and

what is the <u>exceeding greatness of His power toward us</u> who believe,

The **POWER** to *live the Christian life* is **already there!**

What we <u>really need to KNOW</u> is the **truth** about <u>ourselves in Christ!</u>

We need to know that we are children of God

We need to constantly be reminded of the grace and gospel of God
That our sins are forgiven

That we have been reconciled to God by the blood of Christ

We need the *eyes of our understanding to be opened* to our **position** *in Christ*,

that we are seated in heavenly places in Christ.

We need to understand the doctrines of

His providence, His sovereignty

That He has our very hairs numbered, That we are *His peculiar possession* That He **died** of **OUR sin**, <u>specifically!</u>

And we need to KNOW about the **blessed hope** that <u>awaits us</u>.

That is the **teaching** of the **New Testament**.

That is what Jesus **prayed for** His church in John 17:17

Sanctify them <u>IN</u> the truth

That is that we would be **sanctified** as we are **immersed** in an <u>environment</u> of **truth** – <u>hearing</u> and <u>believing</u>.

The Greek word $en - \underline{most often translated}$ as "in" is $\underline{important}$.

It is used here ...

In the same way a Christian is describes as being *IN CHRIST*That is he is in a different sphere ...
No longer *IN the World*, but now *IN Christ* ... *IN the truth* ...

The word *en* suggests **more** than a *mere* **agency** or **means**, but *rather describes* the **sphere** that Christ's disciples are *IN*.

He is sanctified IN the truth

he aletheia <u>THE</u> TRUTH ... the <u>definite article is used!</u> <u>THE</u> TRUTH is a <u>concrete</u>, <u>specific</u> saving reality.

As in John 14:6, Jesus teaches, "I am the way, <u>THE</u> TRUTH, and the life"

Christ is <u>THE</u> TRUTH And our being IN CHRIST, we are therefore IN <u>THE</u> TRUTH.

Christ is *THE LOGOS* – *THE WORD* ...

The living Word ... and all that He is - is conveyed in written form in the Scripture.

We cannot therefore separate

Christ from His Word

or His Word from the truth,
or truth from Christ.

So *IN Christ*, the disciple is **separated unto God** – **separated from the world**, brought **into Christ**, brought **into THE truth**, and it is **this Truth** working in us by the Spirit that produces our **sanctification**.

1 Cor 1:2 says we are sanctified IN Christ Jesus

What a wonderful fact! What a treasure!

Now this may <u>sound a bit *mysterious*</u>, and <u>there are things</u> in this that are **outside the border of our understanding** – and ...

We have to <u>be careful</u> when we *talk about such things*, because **mystics** <u>speak in *similar terms*</u>.

<u>They will speak of being IN CHRIST</u> – having a "Christ-consciousness"

The difference is that their position in Christ is <u>mystical</u> — with **no foundation** on <u>revealed truth</u>.

While it is true, that our **sanctification** an <u>invisible work of God</u>, and the details can be <u>difficult to grasp</u> ... it is by <u>no means mystical</u>

Sanctification – is <u>definitive</u> in the life of the Christian. Its results are <u>observable</u>

(just as a child grows *physically*, the growth of a Christian should be **evident**)

And as I have <u>repeated time and again</u>, **sanctification** <u>does not come by *osmosis*</u> ... it comes by **being disciplined** *in the Word of God*!

<u>I repeat this</u> because <u>the devil</u> will <u>send all sorts of **deception**</u> to make **sanctification** appear <u>easy</u> or <u>formulaistic</u> ...

Sanctification is <u>very different</u> for the <u>mystic</u> – <u>His answer to everything</u> is "surrender" "Let go and let God."

Others offer *quick prescriptions for sanctification* ... Memorize Romans 6,7 & 8 ...

If it were only that easy!

If I thought for a moment that I could

get rid of the remnants of indwelling sin

by memorizing Romans 6,7, & 8 ...

I'd be a fool to spend any time preaching anything else,
but reading these chapters every time we met.

(I'm not saying you shouldn't memorize Rom 6,7,8 it could be an excellent practice to
help you meditate on the Word —
but its not a technique —
much teaching on sanctification comes down to
techniques ...

pray this prayer,
tear down this specific stronghold
say 10 "Hail Marys" ... Holy Water

Also,

<u>Sanctification doesn't come</u> by your **making vows** and **promises** that <u>you cannot keep</u>.

That's why "Promise Keepers" has **faded out** ...

Hundreds of thousands of Christians were **coerced** into making **7 promises** ...

Let me tell you if that really worked,

Promise Keepers wouldn't have faded out ...

the problem is <u>man is a **Promise-breaker**</u> – <u>**not**</u> a *Promise-keeper*.

<u>Young people, ...</u> your **moral** and **sexual purity**, will **NOT** come by the means of **vows** and **promises** ...

The Scripture asks the question ... How can a young man, keep his way pure? The answer being, By keeping it according to Thy Word!

Not by **signing a covenant** ... Not by wearing some **promise bracelet**

Not by vowing to not sin

Not by writing your sin on a piece of paper and burning it ...

<u>If our will</u> is going to be **persuaded** – it **must** be by <u>**Truth**</u> – <u>**THAT**</u> is **how God works!**

I find no New Testament teaching suggesting that there is the slightest justification for ever calling on people to make promises and vows to be sanctified — its wrong in evangelism, and its wrong in sanctification.

So what then is sanctification?

How is it stimulated in the life of a Christian?

New Testament sanctification is a matter of KNOWING CHRIST

Being rightly related to God
Becoming entirely devoted to Him
Separated from the world, yes,
but more than that,
separated unto God
Sharing His life.

The **goal** is not even that we **be holy men**, or to **attain holiness**, but rather to live in *fellowship* with God!

And *so many* do not know this! They're playing games with **holiness** ...

Thinking that they can **complete** a <u>finished work</u> ... Or **waiting around** for some <u>mystical</u> second blessing

Sanctification is completely the work of God,

in fact *it is a work* that **Christ completed at the cross**, and is only *working itself out in our daily life* ...

His work ... works in and through us.

And God's invisible and mysterious work in sanctification will only happen by the completely non-mysterious discipline of hearing, reading, studying and meditating on the Word of God!

It's not "Easy does it" or "Let go and let God" Or "just surrender"

We must realize that sanctification is something that will not happen in us without a struggle and a fight.

The Bible teaches us that there is a **remnant of sin** remaining in that **body of death**, which we will carry with us

And as long as we live ...

the flesh lusts against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary to one another, so that you do not do the things that you wish. (Gal 5:17)

We will ever be in a **battle** whereby the Spirit wages war against the flesh, and our **only offensive weapon**

is the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God.

We are sanctified as we are <u>IN</u> <u>THE</u> TRUTH.

You see why its important to be in this Word?

Oh, the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments and unfathomable His ways! (Rom 11)

We have an **ocean of truth** in this Word ...

Why are we so content with drops of water?

<u>Don't neglect</u> this **discipline** of **taking in the Scripture**, my brothers and sisters ...

1 Thess 2:13-14

And for this cause we also constantly thank God that when you received from us the word of God, you received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually performs its work in you who believe.

The work of <u>sanctification</u> in the life ...

without which no man shall see God

is done <u>IN</u> the <u>Word of God</u> ...

it <u>cannot be done</u> apart from the <u>Word of God</u>.

The **word of God** is the *God-ordained means* for your **sanctification**, and to the extent that you **practice** the **spiritual discipline** of **Scripture** *hearing*, *reading*, *study* and *meditation*, we will experience **sanctifying grace**.

As we do, we will find <u>our minds transformed</u>, so that we <u>no longer live</u>, <u>act</u>, <u>walk</u>, <u>talk</u>, <u>think</u> **like the world**, but

Scripture will govern the way we act, talk, walk, think and live.

<u>The Word of God</u> is the **tool** that the **Holy Spirit** uses to make us **more** like Christ ... to have **grow** in *holiness*.

It happens as we **Know Christ** *IN His Word*

That is why it was David's treasure

in that it is more valuable than gold, yea than much fine gold

And it is his pleasure –

In that it is sweeter also than honey of the honey comb.

I left you last time with some exhortations ...

that you should read the Word

in such a way so as to come to a deeper knowledge of the greatness and holiness of God ... and the magnitude of my sin, which in turn magnifies His grace.

Read your Bible, with an eye toward your sanctification.

I want to give you an example of **such a meditation** from <u>Psalm 119</u> (turn there ... various verses)

I want to show HOW we are sanctified in the truth,

And to *encourage you* to be *sanctified in truth* we will *mine* some of the *gems* found in Psalm 119 –

a psalm of 176 verses –

almost all of which are a prayer for the Word of God

to function in its role

to do its sanctifying work

in the life of the Psalmist.

Now, I've **emphasized** how the **Law is powerless** – that is *in and of itself* – but the **Spirit of God does** *use the law*.

The Law is the <u>instrument</u> that the *Holy Spirit <u>uses</u>* to convict us of sin and quicken us to duty.

<u>I pray that this exercise</u> will **instruct you** in <u>HOW</u>

the Word of God does just that ...
may God be pleased to <u>sanctify</u> us <u>IN</u> THE TRUTH ...

verse 1

How blessed are those whose way is <u>blameless</u>, Who walk in the law of the LORD.

The word *blameless* here <u>in Hebrew</u> is *tamiym* – the **end** or **completion** (which is the Hebrew equivalent of *teleios*) *Completeness*.

It conveys the same idea as **holiness**.

So <u>Psalm 119</u> opens by saying

<u>Happy</u> are those who are <u>complete (HOLY)</u> in their way. Whose walk (<u>lifestyle</u>) is <u>conforming to God's Law</u>.

The *blessedness* of our life ... that is our **HAPPINESS** ... <u>Is dependent upon</u> our **Holiness**.

For <u>any</u> Christian to be *HAPPY*, he must be *HOLY* ...

And that is **not** possible if one **refuses to live** by the Bible.

<u>verse 2</u> continues ... to tell us that our **happiness** is dependent upon our *keeping the Word of God* ...

How <u>blessed</u> are those who <u>observe</u> His testimonies, Who seek Him with their whole heart.

Notice that the **place** we are to **seek God** is **in His Word**. We **cannot** encounter God apart from the Scriptures

Further, our **seeking Him** in the Word, must be with our whole heart

There can be **no place** for *divided loyalties* or *double-mindedness* when it comes to **God's law**.

Too many Christians want to pick and choose what they will obey and what they don't like and will reject ...

Again one **cannot** be **complete** and **happy** living this way.

We cannot *merely* **obey God** in <u>SOME</u> things. We must be completely sold out!

There can be **no place** for *double-mindedness* or *unbelief*

Look at verse 4:

You have ordained Your precepts, That we should keep them <u>diligently</u>.

We must <u>give ourselves</u> to the <u>pursuit of holiness</u> <u>IN</u> the Truth – it is not enough to put forth some <u>feeble effort</u>.

Diligence suggests a careful study.

We are to **love** and **delight** in the Scriptures, more and more, until we become as the Bereans, and search daily. and diligently

We see how the law <u>produces</u> practical holiness in <u>verse 9</u>

How can a young man keep his way pure? By keeping it according to Your word. In order to avoid a way of life that will bring dishonor and disaster and ruin,

one must guard his life according to the direction of Scripture.

This verse is directed to young men.

There is **NOTHING better** that <u>we can do for young people</u> than to **teach them** how to <u>read</u>, <u>study</u> and <u>apply the Scripture</u>.

No amount of *lectures* on abstinence can **replace this**.

<u>It is a shame</u> that there are <u>so many</u>
<u>Programs, activities, mission trips, entertainment</u> and <u>concerts</u>
<u>out there</u> for **Christian youth** ...
and it all comes with <u>good intentions</u> ...

but there is **little effort** to **study the Scriptures** with them.

Again **sanctification** is *through truth* – and **God's Word is truth**.

Either we believe it or not!

The Word of God is the <u>ONLY</u> protection you have to guard your <u>purity</u>.

But this is <u>not only</u> for **young people** ... <u>look at verse 11</u> – which **applies to all of us**:

Your word I have treasured in my heart, That I may not sin against You.

Here *the Word of God* is <u>seen</u> as <u>portable truth</u> — that is a truth we can carry with us — in our hearts — that will <u>keep us from sin</u>.

When I read this, I am reminded how Jesus was tempted to sin in the wilderness, at each point, He quoted the Word of God.

<u>Likewise</u>, we **must** become <u>thoroughly familiar</u> with the **Scriptures**.

It is when we **don't** have the Scripture **in our heart**, we become **confused** about **what action to take**.

It is <u>natural</u> for us as we <u>make daily decisions</u> to **look to our human reasoning** ...

but the <u>first course</u> of action <u>must</u> be to turn to the **Scripture** where we will **find wisdom**

We should be aware of **EVERYTHING** that the Scripture addresses.

We should **be so familiar** *with the Word* that if someone says *the Bible says* ..., and it **doesn't** we **recognize it right away**.

Or <u>if faced with a decision</u> or <u>course of action</u> —
that we would be aware
whether there is something in the Bible
that directly addresses or can be applied to your situation.
Otherwise we will be susceptible to wrong suggestions —
we will not be able to <u>evaluate</u> what we <u>see</u> and <u>hear</u> —
everything will "sound good" to us —
even if it <u>violates</u> the Word of God.

That is why <u>verse 24</u> says:

Your testimonies also are my delight; They are my <u>counselors</u>.

The Scripture is where we must **go first** for **counsel**, and **all counsel** we receive is weighed **against** the **Scripture**.

We have seen that **the Scripture** will *keep us from sin*

and it will also keep sin from us as verse 29 reads:

Remove the false way from us

That word *false* is *lying* ...

The <u>devil</u>, the *father of lies*,

we are told he can *transform Himself into an angel of light* ... so it can *appear* as though **he is telling the truth**, if we do not *adequately* **know the <u>standard</u>** – *the Law of God* we are *easy prey* to his **lying ways**.

verse 32:

I shall <u>run</u> the way of Your commandments, For You will enlarge my heart.

What is being expressed here by the Psalmist is the idea that he realizes his own inability ...

The *smallness* of <u>his own heart</u> to **keep the word**, so he **calls upon God** to *enlarge his heart* ... to *open his understanding* ... to *increase his faith* ...

he is honest and <u>anxious</u> to have his *heart enlarged* – that he might *all the more* <u>run</u> the way of God's Word.

Maybe today you think yourself inadequate to understand

the Word of God ... well we all are – apart from the Holy Spirit ... ask Him to enlarge your heart so that you will understand the Scriptures.

In <u>verses 36</u>, we see how *the Word of God* is <u>opposed</u> to the **lusts of the flesh** – <u>dishonest gain</u> and <u>vain imaginations</u>.

Incline my heart to Your testimonies
And not to dishonest gain.
Turn away my eyes from looking at vanity,
And revive me in Your ways.
Establish Your word to Your servant,
As that which produces reverence for You.

The Psalmist realizes that one cannot serve two masters, God and money.

<u>Further he realizes</u> that he **cannot** <u>waste his time</u> looking at *vain things*.

Think of how much time we waste watching television, reading magazines, surfing the internet ...

not even talking about explicitly bad things here ...
but merely vain (pointless) things.

Think of all of the time we spend pursuing material earthly gain ...

This is because the world <u>squeezes</u> our <u>minds</u> into <u>their pattern of thinking</u>.

We must realize, as the Psalmist does, and as

Paul instructs in Romans 12:2,
that *our mind* must be <u>renewed</u> by Scripture.

The Psalmist **realizes** that *this mindset* is <u>accomplished</u> by <u>bowing his heart</u> to the <u>Word of God</u>.

And when *the Word* is <u>established</u> <u>in a person</u>, it produces (vs. 38) *reverence for God* ...the *fear of the Lord*.

So when we *fear man instead of fearing God*, let it be our prayer ...

Establish Your word to Your servant, As that which produces <u>reverence for You</u>. verse 45 says:

And I will walk at liberty, For I seek Your precepts.

Initially this **seems incompatible** ...

we do **not** consider **freedom** as consistent with **precepts**.

Precepts seem **rigid**, the opposite of freedom.

This is a non-Christian view.

<u>In John 6</u>, Jesus taught ...

that *the one who is <u>set free</u>*, is the same *one who abides in the Word*

{Work illustration - boundaries}

Are you beginning to see

role of the law has in progressively sanctifying us.

It keeps us <u>pure</u>, it keeps us <u>from sin</u>, from the <u>false way</u>, it keeps us from <u>dishonest gain</u>, and <u>vanity</u>, in it we can <u>walk at liberty</u>.

You see why you <u>need</u> the Word of God?

How we must (as vss. 59-60 exhort us)

considered our ways
And turn our feet to His testimonies.
hasten and not delay
To keep His commandments.

If God has convicted you today of your need to read His Word, to not delay in setting up a regular reading schedule ... begin today!

You've gotta do it ...
No one is going to turn your feet for you.

Psalms 119:92

Promises us strength to stand in affliction

If Your law had not been my delight, Then I would have perished in my affliction.

Affliction may strip us of everything, but the Scripture remains our delight

<u>If we have nothing else</u>, we *always* have *the Word of God* - <u>settled</u>, <u>fixed</u>, <u>certain</u> ... and **that is enough** to **delight in.**

Those who *treasure* and *delight* in *the Word* — who *meditate upon it day and night* ... are those who can **handle** the **trials** of *life*.

Our stability in the midst of trials

Is only a product of the Word in us.

We have a <u>responsibility</u> in this matter.

Look at verse101

I have <u>restrained my feet</u> from every evil way, That I may keep Your word.

It is a **DISIPLINE**

we must restrain our feet from the evil way

Anything ... that keeps you from the Word must be combated!

May God give us the grace to restrain our feet

from the <u>computer</u>, from <u>entertainment</u>, from the <u>television</u>, from <u>anything</u> that might keep us <u>from that Word</u>.

Concluding our brief tour through Psalm 119,

<u>Psalms 119:133</u> again shows the <u>disparity</u> between the **Word** and sin ...

Establish my footsteps in Your word, And do not let any iniquity have dominion over me.

When our feet are firmly established in the Word, iniquity will not have dominion ... sin will no longer reign.

As you become *firmly established in the Word*, you will find it <u>easier to believe Romans 6</u> – that *sin is no longer your master*

You'll believe that that you are a partaker of the divine nature
That you have been born-again
And are a new creature
That you are no longer a natural man, but a new man.

That if Christ is in you, the body is dead because of sin

Your whole position has changed

From a *hater of God* and <u>His law</u> to a <u>lover of God</u> and <u>His law</u>.

You will find your **desire** is to **be holy** – to **live a sanctified life**

You will believe that it is no longer you who live, but Christ lives in you

That His law is no longer grievous to you

It does not go against the grain of the new man

You will delight in it, in your inner man

Why? Because ...

Christ is in you, living His life through you.

Also this truth of Christ dwelling in me

<u>promotes</u> **my sanctification** by giving me a *whole new view of sin*.

<u>Sin</u> will become no longer so much what I do or fail to do, but <u>that</u> which separates me from this intimate union

I have with Christ

And finally, the <u>awesome **promise** of *holiness IN* the *Truth*...</u>

Psalms 119:165

Those who <u>love Your law</u> have <u>great peace</u>, And <u>nothing</u> causes them to stumble.

There is **no need to** *stumble and fall* if one is *IN the Truth*.

Sin creeps in when we are <u>unprotected</u> – during down time – in <u>moments</u> of <u>vanity</u> and <u>wasted times</u> ... not when we are <u>engrossed in the Word of God</u>.

Eph 4:27 "Neither give place to the devil"

We all struggle with things of the mind ... a <u>lack of peace</u> in one area or another ... <u>temptations</u> ...

But when you are **consumed** with the **Word of God** – it gives **no place** for the devil.

When you are in the Word of God ... it <u>crowds out</u> the devil's opportunities.

You get **consumed**, and that **is** the **way** it **should be** – and *the more it is*, the **less likely** we will *stumble*.

What you believe will be either <u>conformed to</u> the Word of God ... Or by the *standards of the world*.

If you are <u>loose</u> in this discipline – if you neglect doctrine, you will inevitably become <u>loose</u> in life and your behavior.

Your doctrine and your life are indissolubly linked!

Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable,

Let others say what they may about you, but you stand upon THE truth –

immovable ...

always abounding in the work of the Lord,

knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.

May God be pleased to exalt the Lord in our lives by the realization of this Word

May God so bless this truth and bring glory to Himself

Amen.
