A Survey of Church History, Part 50d: Hendrik De Cock



MIDST THESE PASTORAL TRANSITIONS, a hunger lingered in the hearts of Ulrum's people. They longed for more than moralistic sermons; their souls craved the sustenance of Biblical and God-centered preaching. Dissatisfied with

de Groot's approach, they remained discontent with De Cock as well. Ironically, de Groot had identified these seekers as peculiar, urging De Cock to extend them special pastoral care. In this subtle tension, God was weaving a narrative of transformation in the heart of Ulrum's humble congregation.

In his earnest desire to guide his flock, De Cock endeavored to illuminate the path of a virtuous life through education. However, his attempts fell on resistant hearts. Among the faithful who sought guidance, a humble laborer named Klaas Pieters Kuipenga, a regular visitor to the parsonage for catechesis, refused to confess his faith under de Groot's teachings. Kuipenga, a simple and uneducated saint, earnestly conveyed to De Cock that the instruction provided little solace. He expressed a profound unease, fearing that even the smallest contribution on his part to salvation would lead to eternal loss. His soul thirsted for salvation in Christ, yet he felt a drought, with no one to offer the refreshing drink of grace. This poignant struggle echoed throughout the Netherlands, where thousands like Kuipenga yearned for spiritual relief. De Cock, a devoted shepherd, faced the weighty task of aiding these troubled sheep. The pressing question lingered: How could be extend a helping hand to those in need?

As De Cock sought answers, he found himself in the study of a fellow minister in a nearby village. In the course of their conversation, the minister turned to Calvin's Institutes to support a point. Struck by the impact, De Cock requested to borrow the copy and, in doing so, found himself immersed in its pages, reading it repeatedly with a mix of amazement and growing concern.

During this time of immersing himself in Calvin's profound work, De Cock also explored the Canons of Dort, writings from earlier Reformed Dutch theologians, and the more devotional works of a contemporary author, Cornelis Baron van Zuylen van Nijveldt. It was Van Zuylen van Nijveldt's pamphlet, "De Eenige Redding" (The Only Salvation), that opened De Cock's eyes to the profound truth that all godly living is firmly grounded in doctrine.

It's entirely expected that De Cock's preaching underwent a significant transformation after encountering these reformed writings. The more he delved into the profound historical doctrines of God's sovereign and particular grace, the more evident it became in his sermons. His messages, articulating salvation by grace through faith in Christ and His atoning sacrifice, continued to gain clarity. As the word of this impactful preaching spread rapidly through the surrounding countryside, it's no wonder that people, hungry for the Bread of Life, flocked to Ulrum to hear De Cock speak.
