Introduction—How do we wage peace in the world as the New Humanity in Christ?

- I. Waging Peace requires knowing what time it is
 - A. Three ages of Christianity (this is very quick and dirty)
 - 1. Ancient Christianity (Ascension to 1650)
 - 2. Modernity. 1650–1914ish
 - 3. Post–modernity. 1914–present
 - B. Christianity in the cafeteria vs. Christianized Culture
 - C. Christianity became institutionalized with Constantine.
 - D. In many ways, we are back to Christianity in the cafeteria and we must wage peace much like the early church.
 - E. Early Christian "social project"
 - F. They were "in the world, not of the world"
- II. Overcoming cultural impediments through Evangelism
 - A. Are you trying to change the world?
 - B. Be on the look-out for "cultural impediments" and seek to overcome them.
 - C. Don't lose sight of the gospel.
 - D. Overcome the cultural impediment of the **suspicion of authority** by being intentional and personal
 - E. Overcome the cultural impediment of **competing narratives** by questioning people's answers before you answer people's questions (Prov 20:5)
 - F. Overcome the cultural impediment of "pluralism" and "relevance" by keeping the Gospel as "the good news"
- III. Purging the church of the demons of the zeitgeist through **Discipleship**
 - A. Discipleship is primarily about remembering old things rather than learning new things
 - B. Discipleship is about passing on the "deposit" from one generation to the next generation
 - C. The deposit of our discipleship must be updated for every generation in its language and context, not in its content.
- IV. Salting the world with lives changed (and being changed) by the gospel
 - A. Moral Conduct as attractive life that draws people to the gospel
 - B. The Battle is Spiritual, not physical
- V. Waging Peace with the World through Worship
 - A. Worship completes the picture by giving unbelievers a glimpse into the holy of holies of the New Humanity in Christ

Questions:

- 5. How is "individualism" a cultural impediment to discipleship?
- 6. In what ways should our discipleship and catechesis *conform* to the culture and in what ways should it *resist conformity to the culture?*
- 7. Which is more effective in "changing the world," liturgy or politics? Why?
