

<p><b>The Doctrine of Work</b> <i>What are vocations, occupations, and reasons to work?</i></p> <p><b>Planning Our Work</b> Do not rely on <i>providence</i> or <i>prophecy</i>. An “open door” may be a temptation. A “closed door” may be a test of patience. God seeks our wisdom over telling us plainly. Stay in the “<i>command corral</i>” and seek <i>counsel</i>. The commands are a fence not to cross. The counsel of those who know us well helps. Make a decision in faith, hope, and love. Expect a <i>zig-zag path</i>, not a line between A and B! See how God led Joseph, Moses, David, &amp; Paul!</p>	<p><i>What is a sentence? What must a sentence have?</i></p> <p><b>Kinds of Sentences</b> <i>Declarative</i> – points it out This sentence gives a <i>thought</i> (makes a “point”). The indicative is an index finger that points. <i>Imperative</i> – calls it out (the subject is often “you”) This sentence gives a <i>command</i> or a <i>request</i>. This sentence imposes our will on another. <i>Interrogative</i> – finds it out This sentence asks a <i>question</i>. The word order is often verb, then subject. <i>Exclamatory</i> – makes a shout Look for the exclamation point and few rules!</p>
Scripture	Proverb
<p>The tutor asks the question and students respond. The first two verses are the priority in the first year. (A shortened version, as here, can be learned first.) <i>All these prophecies come from 700 years before Jesus.</i></p> <p><b>How will the Messiah be born?</b> “Behold, a virgin will be with child and bear a son, and she will call His name Immanuel.” —Isaiah 7:14</p> <p><b>Note:</b> The verse initially calls this a “sign,” a miracle. This word lets us know that “virgin” is not simply “young woman,” which the Hebrew would allow. “Immanuel” means “God with us” (Mt. 1:23).</p> <p><b>What will the Messiah be called?</b> “Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace.” —Isaiah 9:6</p> <p><b>Note:</b> These titles are mainly titles that belong to God: “Wonder” (Jdg. 13:18), “Mighty God” (Isa. 10:21), and “Eternal” (Isa. 57:15)—the title “Father” does not deny the Trinity. His cross gives life (53:10).</p> <p><b>Where will the Messiah be born?</b> “But as for you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you One will go forth for Me to be ruler of Israel. His goings forth are from long ago, from the days of eternity.” —Micah 5:2</p> <p><b>Note:</b> See how clear this prophecy is (cf. Mt. 2:4-6). Jesus predates His birth—His ways are “of old.” And yet He is human—a “child born” (Isa. 9:6).</p> <p>Practice the “Bonus” passage with the older children.</p>	<p>The teacher should memorize the <b>introduction</b> and quote it with <i>lively emphasis</i>, while looking the students one by one in the eye.</p> <p><b>Memorize:</b> Do not envy evil men, Nor want them as your friend. They think up harm, And talk up trouble; Hellfire is their end. —from Proverbs 24:1-2</p> <p>The <i>saying</i> should be memorized, but not the reference. Show the picture (see the document of thirty pictures).</p> <p><b>Note:</b> These proverbs have three warnings about envy. Specifically, they warn against envying the wicked. This type of envy must be a huge temptation.</p> <p>Parents must ask, “Who do my children wish to be?” Parents must ask, “Whom do they enjoy watching?” Parents must ask, “Whom do they pretend to be?” <i>If the wicked fill their imagination, warn them!</i></p> <p>It may sound harsh to teach children to say “hellfire,” but the reality is more shocking. Let’s warn them!</p>
