- I. Remember Our Perspective For Isaiah
 - A. "Isaiah contains an escalating series of creation-fall-redemption motifs, in which the prophet frequently declares the coming of a Deliverer who will bring about the full redemption of God's people and this fallen world."
 - B. Creation-Fall (Judgment)-Redemption
- II. Isaiah 7-12
 - A. This section of Isaiah is a series of this creation-fallredemption motif, concerning the impending judgment coming at the hands of the Assyrians
 - B. It is one large message, delivered in repeated cycles that escalate.
 - C. Quick overview
 - 1. Creation of an enemy against the people of God (Isaiah 7:1)
 - 2. Fall into fear (Isaiah 7:2)
 - 3. Promise of deliverance (Isaiah 7:3-17)
 - a. A reference to Jesus
 - b. Matthew 1:23
 - 4. Creation of a new enemy, leading to a new fall (Isaiah 7:18-25)
 - 5. Redemption from the new enemy, through a deliverer and the power of God's Word (8:1-20)
 - a. Reference to Jesus
 - b. Immanuel 8:8
 - 6. A new fall on those who are unrepentant still (8:21-22)
 - 7. A global deliverance by a global deliverer (9:1-7)
 - a. A Reference to Jesus

- b. Matthew 4:13-17; Luke 1:32-33, 78-79; 2:11; John 1:45
- 8. Another fall into rebellion with another judgment, this time more immense in magnitude and on both God's people and the foreign powers against God's people (9:8-10:19)
- 9. The redemption of remnant after the severity of judgment (10:20-34)
- 10. The promise of a great deliverer to secure salvation in a local sense (Judah and Israel) and in a global sense (for those Gentile oppressors) (11:1-16)
 - a. A Reference to Jesus
 - b. Romans 15:12; Revelation 19:11; 22:16
- 11. The picture of everlasting praise and glory for the mighty work of final redemption that the Lord has accomplished (12:1-6)
 - a. This is a celebration of Jesus
 - b. It is the worship song of the redeemed

III. Looking Forward

- A. What we hope to see in the coming weeks
 - 1. The seriousness of rebellion and sin against God by His people
 - 2. The severity of God's hand against wickedness
 - 3. The sovereign work of God both in judgment and redemption
 - 4. The redemption accomplished by God through the "Deliverer", who is Jesus
 - 5. The final state of those redeemed, and the global, cosmic nature of that final redemption.
