

God's Breath or Man's Breath? John 7:10-18

November 7, 2004

Exegetical point: When truly teaching the doctrine of Jesus Christ, one will always glorify God and not man, but he who speaks from and about man seeks his own glory.

Homiletical point: How may we discern whether one's doctrine consists of the words of men or the words of God?

I. Introduction: Jesus goes to Jerusalem – in God's way, at God's time and for God's purpose

Proposition: The techniques, practices and teachings of man has replaced God's methodology in the church today.
