Jesus Delivers the Mute and Possessed Man (Matt 9: 32-34; 12:22-36)

- Jesus just healed the two blind men (Matt 9:32-34)
- Blindness was a picture of unbelief.
- Faith of the man born blind and contrasting with the unbelief of the Pharisees.
- Healings are a picture of the divine mission of Messiah (Isaiah 35: 5,6; 32: 1-4).

I. The Mute and Possessed Man (9:32a)

- A. A Demon possessed mute man.
- B. God who created the mouth.
- C. Jesus releases the man, and he speaks.
- D. Gospel pictures.

II. The Marveling Multitudes Praise God (9: 33)

- A. Powerless Religion.
- B. Could this be the Son of David?

III. The Pharisees Blaspheme (9: 34)

- A. Men love darkness because their deeds are evil.
- B. Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks.
- C. Has Jesus Christ set your tongue loose to praise Him?

"Becoming Sin for Us" (2 Corinthians 5:21)

- 2 Cor 5: 1-5 focuses on resurrection of Christ.
- 5: 9-11 the judgment seat of Christ.
- 5: 12-21 Paul focuses on the matter of reconciliation.

I. He Who Knew No Sin (5:21a)

• No difficulty with Jesus as a spotless Lamb – sinless

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Heb 7: 26; 1 John 3: 5.
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- A. He knew no sin.
- B. Born into this world to be the "spotless Lamb of God."

II. He "Made" Him Who Knew no Sin, to Be Sin for Us (5:21b)

- How can He who knew no sin become sin for us?
- Not because Jesus sinned in His flesh (Heb 7:26; 1 John 3:5).
 - A. Jesus took our place He became our substitute.

B. Substitutionary atonement, penal suffering: heart of the gospel.

III. That We Might Become the Righteousness of God in Him (5:21c)

- Paul's statements here are at the very heart of what the Gospel is.
 - A. "Sin for us" Jesus bore our sins in His body "for us."

B. The Righteousness of God "In Him."

C. Christ is your life.
