How are they organized/structured?

- · Constitutional
 - Book of Discipline
 - Book of Resolutions
- Episcopal
 - Bishops and superintendents
 - Handle appointments and itinerancy of elders
 - Ordained Clergy
 - ➤ Elders (itinerate)
 - Graduate education required, generally moved around regularly, ordained by bishop

Methodism

- ➤ Deacons (non-itinerate)
 - Service role
- Licensed Local Pastors/LLPs (appointment year-to-year)
 - Completes a church course of study, but is not required to have attended seminary and is not ordained
 - Perform functions of elder but only in their specific context
 - Appointment is renewed annually

Methodism

- Connectional (Geographic Groupings)
 - General church
 - Jurisdictions
 - Annual conferences
 - Districts
 - Local churches
 - Members
- General Conference ("Legislative Branch")
 - Meets every four years—only level of hierarchy that can determine policy and rule for the entire church
- Council of Bishops ("Executive Branch")
 - Carry out the rulings and practice of the church

Methodism

- Judicial Council ("Judicial Branch")
 - Ensures that legislation past at every level is conformity with the Book of Discipline
- A version of this structure repeats at the jurisdictional, annual conference and district level
