 - 4. Would this not be a violation of the covenant?
 - D. God's deliverance
 - 1. Vast army will become weak and useless (Assyrians fulfill this in Isaiah 37:36-37)
 - 2. God will overwhelm the enemy in an incredible, unexpected way
 - 3. Metaphor for the enemy the dreamer
 - 4. God will always bring a remnant into life and peace (repentance, faith, grace)
