The Profound Practicality of Story, Identity, and Weaponry in Ephesians

I. The Intention of our Study

- A. In our study of Ephesians, we are <u>Not</u> interested in **Plastic platitudes** and **Hollow Beatitudes**
- B. Rather, we are interested in <u>Christ-Shaped Attitudes</u> forged on the anvil of sincere wrestling with the revelation of God in the company of the people of God (Eph 2:10).
- C. 3 Goals
 - 1. Learn how to practically engage the story, embrace the identity, and take up the weaponry of the riches of the gospel *in your own life*.
 - 2. Seek to help fellow Christians to do the same thing (i.e., discipleship/counseling)
 - 3. Having mastered this application in Ephesians, go on to use the same model of story, identity, and weaponry in the rest of the bible (Eph. 5:18-20)

II. Finding our Place in God's Story: The New Humanity in Christ

- A. We are interested in finding our place in the **story** of God's redemptive history
- B. Everyone lives according to a narrative, a story, a plot.
- C. The book of Ephesians tells us that story
 - 1. Out of love, God predestined us to share in Christ (chap 1).
 - 2. The Fall rendered us DOA; we were dead in our trespasses and sins (Eph 2)
 - 3. But God, by His grace, made us alive together with Christ (Eph 2)
 - 4. He did this for the Jews in the O.C. but the mystery was that he would bring the Gentiles into this group making them **one new man** (Eph 2 and 3)
 - 5. Christians are called to live out of the ethic of this new humanity (Eph 4–6)

III. The New Humanity as the Solution to the Pandemic of Identity Crisis

- A. Identity crisis?
- B. Union with Christ as Identity ("In Him," Eph 1)

- C. As the new humanity, we constantly **ground our ethic** (i.e., behavior, how we live) in the **indicative of the gospel** rather than in the **indicative** of felt needs, emotions, circumstances, or opinions
- D. The Practical is in the Profound

IV. The Weaponry of the New Humanity

- A. Ephesians will broaden our perspective (Eph 6:12–13)
- B. C.R. Wiley calls Ephesians a "handbook for guerrilla piety"
- C. What are we fighting for?
- D. Ephesians reminds us that there is a three-tiered universe—Heavenly places, the regions of hell, and earth in the middle
- E. Christ fought and overcame, and we are to fight and overcome
- F. We fight by waging guerilla piety
- G. Profound Practicality
 - A. Our **enemy** (Eph. 3:8–10)
 - B. Our **goal**=cosmos (Eph. 1:17-23)
- H. How do we sharpen the weapons of righteousness?
 - 1. Through Prayer (Eph 6:18)
 - 2. Through hearing Christ in the preached word (Eph 2:17)
 - 3. By putting off the old man and putting on Christ (Eph 4:22–24)
