

“Measuring the Glorified Jerusalem” (Zechariah 2)

Introduction (Zechariah 1:12–17)

Big Idea: The coming Zion is too sprawling and secure for city walls.

The city with God as its defense needs no walls. (Isaiah 4:2–6)
- II. The Vision Reinforced (verses 6–13)
 - a. The Lord’s Reversal of Exile among the Nations (verses 6–7)

Isaiah 52:11–12; 2 Corinthians 6:14–18; Revelation 17:4–6, 18; 18:1–5
 - b. The Lord’s Promise of Plunder from the Nations (verses 8–9)

Isaiah 53:11–12
 - c. The Nations’ Union with Immanuel as His People (verses 10–13)

Zechariah 9:9; John 1:14; Isaiah 19:24–25; Zechariah 9:6–7; 14:16; Isaiah 64:1–3; Malachi 3:1; 1 Timothy 3:16

Further Implications

- 1) We only need God's glory in Christ to attract the world to Zion.

- 2) Our highest identity and allegiance do not belong to this perishing world.
